<p>LUV focuses on children and women who are at risk for human trafficking and oppression, specifically in places of extreme poverty and conflict.</p>	<p>LUV provides a holistic, intersectionality approach to empowerment and reducing vulnerability to human trafficking.</p>	<p>LUV measures impact by focusing on how well we achieve empowerment by reducing vulnerabilities to trafficking and increasing the number of changemakers.</p>
<p>LUV partners with directors from 3 community-based organizations that form an indigenously directed anti-trafficking network spanning Sudan & South Sudan.</p>	<p>There are 3 program areas for empowerment:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. protection 2. education 3. economic development 	<p>IMPACT = empowered children and women to be changemakers in their own lives and communities.</p>
<p>From 2005 - 2024, an estimated 3,953 students have been supported, 364 completed high school and 28 graduated college on a LUV scholarship.</p> <p>Additionally, in 2024, 434 women became changemakers* through their leadership roles and employment opportunities.</p>	<p>In 2024, LUV was able to serve 1,429 students (680F/749M) from PreK to university, supporting basic needs of 1,412 (672F/740M), engaging 23 transitioning alumni in internships (7F/16M).</p> <p>In 2024, more than 2,082 people including 1,429 students, 23 interns, 630 community members became changemakers* through their leadership roles and economic empowerment.</p>	<p>*IMPACT of becoming changemaker is measured by any two or more of these factors:</p> <p>Literate[^], completed diploma or degree, employed in safe job, inspired by faith to improve community, improved health (emotional, physical), influenced change in profession, culture, economy.</p> <p>[^]Passing lower primary level of education (grade 3).</p>

IMPACT for 2025 = Over 1,429 students and 434 women are EMPOWERED AS CHANGEMAKERS (*as per criteria above)

<p>1—Child soldiers, child brides, child labor, unmet basic needs in safe housing, food, water, medical</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Factors of insecurity from 5+ decades of conflict, disruption of infrastructure, and unmet basic needs have led to tier 3 levels of trafficking in both South Sudan and Sudan (TIP Report) • In Sudan, 54% of women living in Sudan's poorest households and 52% of girls in South Sudan (Girls Not Brides) married before the age of 18. • 45.6 % of children in South Sudan between 10 -14 are working (Bureau of Int'l Labor Affairs) 	<p>1—PROTECTION</p> <p>In 2024 LUV rescued and prevented the trafficking of 184 new children (86F/98M) and provided safe housing for 754 children (370F/384M) who had no other option.</p> <p>Essential food, water and medical care were provided for 1,412 students (672F/740M). 3 students (2F/1M) received life-saving emergency medical evacuations to Kenya, followed by recovery at LUV's Kenya safe-house.</p>	<p>Short-Term Indicators for 2025: (PROT) rescued >47 new children (24F/23M). (PROT) life-saving food and medical care for >1,412 students (672F/740M).</p> <p>Long-Term Outcomes for 2025: (PROT) >754 children in safe housing (370F/384M). (PROT) >1,412 children (672F/740M) food and water secure.</p>
<p>2—Lack of Education:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 70% of school age children in South Sudan (76% F) do not have access to education (UNICEF) • 90% of school age children in Sudan do not have access to education (World Vision) • Only 27% of the adult population of South Sudan can read and write • Access to education is key to preventing early marriage, child soldier recruitment, high birth rates and poverty (UNESCO) 	<p>2—EDUCATION</p> <p>In 2024, LUV provided education for 1,412 students (672F/740M) in PreK to High School with 134 achieving literacy (63F/71M). >80% of students passed grade levels (progressed in their education) at the end of the 2024 school year.</p> <p>Trade school/university scholarships were provided for 17 alumni (8F/9M).</p> <p>With >616 changemaker* students (323F/293M) engaged in community service or school and church leadership positions.</p>	<p>Short-Term Indicators for 2025: (EDU) >138 achieve literacy (76F/62M). (EDU) >82% of students passed grade levels (progress in their education) at the end of the 2025 school year.</p> <p>Long-Term Outcomes for 2025: (EDU) >1,429 students educated (680F/749M); including >24 on LUV's scholarship (8F/16M) in university / trade school and >52 new high school graduates (17F/35M). (EDU) >1,100 changemaker* students (600F/500M) engaged in community service or school and church leadership positions.</p>
<p>3—Economic Poverty:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • South Sudan has lowest HDI with 70% living in extreme poverty (South Sudan Poverty) • Sudan has highest poverty in N. Africa with 32% who live below poverty line (prior to war erupting in 2023) (Sudan Poverty) 	<p>3—ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT</p> <p>In 2024, LUV created jobs for 653 community members (434F/219M) who support an additional 5,877 people; including 217 with full-time salaries (73F/144M) and 436 on contract for projects (361F/75M). This also included adding 9 new full-time jobs for local leaders to our anti-trafficking network and positions for 23 interns (7F/16M).</p> <p>Farm production increased from 20 acres (in 2020) to 223 acres of expanded agriculture at two school farms (53 OFC/168 HFSS). 85% of all food consumed at one center was grown on their farm.</p>	<p>Short-Term Indicators for 2025: (ECDEV) 658 community members (439F/219M) employed in safe jobs. (ECDEV) 240 acres cultivated for food & income. (ECDEV) >103% food production (supporting school needs) from farm in South Sudan and >21% food production (supporting school needs) in Sudan.</p> <p>Long-Term Outcomes for 2025: (ECDEV) 658 community members (439F/219M); including 25 interns will be economically empowered impacting an estimated 5,922 additional people. (ECDEV) 439 women out of 658 total adults served in changemaker* roles (as per criteria above). (ECDEV) Two of three school farms are achieving >62% being food secure.</p>
