That's why LUV is committed to preventing the trafficking and oppression of vulnerable children and women in warzones — tackling the root causes through protection, education, and economic development.

Every day, our programs create lasting transformation from the ground up. Through the dedication of our indigenously directed anti-trafficking network led by inspiring local leaders. we've seen thousands of lives transformed. From 2005 - 2024, an estimated 3,953 students have been supported, 364 completed high school, and 28 graduated college on a scholarship from LUV. ## PROBLEM

At its core, human trafficking is the exploitation of a person's vulnerabilities. In conflict zones like Sudan and South Sudan, children and women are at the highest risk of being exploited through sex trafficking, domestic servitude, labor trafficking, child brides, or as child soldiers. Exploitation is especially prevalent due to the extreme poverty in these nations, which is intensified by rampant orphanhood, civil unrest or war, child marriages, religious persecution, lack of education, lack of access to medical care, and even lack of access to food and clean water.





# SOLUTION

Preventing human trafficking in warzones requires an agile approach capable of addressing the complex issues of extreme poverty, instability, and lack of infrastructure and resources, which leave millions in Sudan and South Sudan vulnerable or exploited. We work with local and international partners to identify and address the root causes of exploitation and build solutions for equipping and driving positive change. Lift Up the Vulnerable extends practical training, tangible support, and spiritual care through protection, education, and economic development through the only indigenously directed anti-trafficking network spanning both nations. These essential resources are critical components to addressing vulnerabilities and preventing exploitation and trafficking before it begins.

# WHERE WE WORK



### **PROTECTION**

Vulnerable children and women are empowered to thrive long-term by receiving safe housing, nutritious meals, clean water, as well as preventative and emergency medical care. These essential foundations alleviate numerous vulnerabilities that lead to exploitation. We offer these vital resources to support individuals on the path to self-sufficiency as we build up people to care for themselves and their communities.



### **EDUCATION**

Students are equipped to grow intellectually and spiritually in our safe, Christcentered schools. Children in our protection programs and students from the community are provided with formal education from pre-K through high school, along with nutritious meals and medical services. Graduates are offered continuing education through university scholarships and vocational training. We provide mentoring and leadership development to inspire students for a lifetime of learning and growth.



### **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

Communities are transformed through grassroots economic development which provides a catalyst to transition from dependency towards selfsufficiency and stability. Our anti-trafficking network indigenous partners and the children and women we serve are equipped to be innovative and selfsufficient. We invest in strategic initiatives such as large-scale farming, small business income generation, and savings groups to create a path towards economic independence and flourishing.



### We lead the only indigenously-directed anti-human trafficking network spanning Sudan and South Sudan.

In 2024, our programs directly empowered over 2,000 people at our three locations, with an estimated 5,877 additional people impacted. This reflects our commitment to protection, education, and economic development.

## **INFRASTRUCTURE EXPANSION**

New uniforms made by local tailors have been distributed to all students at NLM!

# IMPACT STORIES

## REFAHAT'S JOURNEY: HOPE AMIDST THE WAR IN SUDAN

When war broke out in Sudan in April 2023, 11-year-old Refahat was living with his family in Khartoum, the epicenter of the conflict. Originally from a small farming village in the Nuba Mountains, his family had moved to the capital in search of better opportunities.

As violence engulfed the city, millions fled the terror and destruction caused by the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) and the Sudan Armed Forces (SAF) in their struggle for power. Among the 15 million people displaced within the nation or seeking refuge elsewhere, Refahat's family desperately searched for a way to escape.

"I was in Khartoum with my parents when the war erupted. We were completely displaced and scattered. My father and one of my sisters ran in different directions, and we eventually found our way back to the Nuba Mountains on foot. My mother and the rest of my siblings fled elsewhere, and to this day, I don't know whether they are alive or dead."

In response to the growing crisis, LUV prioritized the protection and support of children affected by the war in Sudan in 2024. **With your help, we opened safe housing and provided education for Refahat and 51 other children at Our Father's Cleft in Sudan.** 

For Refahat, this was his first time ever attending school. Today, he loves school so much that he dreams of becoming a teacher in the future.



As the war in Sudan rages on, nearly 25 million people — half the population — are experiencing severe food insecurity. With 19 million children out of school and roughly 90% of classrooms closed, Sudan is facing the largest education crisis in the world.

Your continued support helps us protect children like Refahat from exploitation and sets them on a path toward hope and healing.

## MARTHA: FROM STUDENT TO TEACHER, BREAKING BARRIERS



Martha grew up in Sudan's wartorn Nuba Mountains, where over half of girls in the poorest households marry before 18.

Determined to change her future, she became a teacher's aide at Our Father's Cleft (OFC) despite not yet finishing high school.

Her dedication stood out — mentoring girls and leading sports — so when she had the chance to study in Uganda, she embraced it.

In Uganda, Martha experienced many firsts — her first flight, running water, and even pizza — but most importantly, she earned her high school diploma in 2020. She then joined LUV's internship program and later received a scholarship to attend a world-class teacher training college in South Sudan.

In November of 2024, Martha graduated with an education degree and is proud to serve at the start of the 2025 school year teaching at Hope for South Sudan (HFSS). In 2026, she plans to return to OFC, the school where her journey began.

Martha's story is a testament to LUV's impact, **empowering** women in the hardest-to-reach places. Alongside others, she is now a mentor and changemaker, ensuring the next generation has opportunities she once only dreamed of.



## NIGHTY: A LEADER IN AGRICULTURE AND COMMUNITY CHANGE



Nighty is a strong, joyful woman who lives with her husband and seven children in the village near the Hope for South Sudan (HFSS) compound. She and her husband farm together, but before joining the HFSS farmer field school (FFS) in 2024, she had little interaction with neighbors. Initially hesitant, she eventually saw the program's impact and decided to participate.

Through FFS, Nighty learned improved farming techniques, boosting her family's income. She now cultivates maize, tomatoes, sorghum, sesame, and, most notably, okra and pumpkin — crops uncommon in her area that proved to be game-changers. With two of her own acres under cultivation, she employs up to ten women and sells directly to local buyers, reducing costs and increasing profits.

The success allowed her family to start a small livestock farm, expand their home, and send seven children and a younger sister to university — once an impossible dream. Beyond financial gains, Nighty has grown in confidence and leadership. She helps fellow farmers, mediate community conflicts, and inspires other women to take charge of their futures. "We now decide what we do," she says proudly, reflecting on the empowerment she and other women have gained.

Nighty's journey from a cautious observer to a respected leader showcases the profound impact of FFS, not just in agriculture but in strengthening entire communities. With your support, women like Martha and Nighty are transforming lives and communities.

# LOOKING AHEAD

## THIS YEAR, LIFT UP THE VULNERABLE IS CELEBRATING A MONUMENTAL MILESTONE — 20 YEARS OF IMPACT

Your support has provided two decades of life-saving work that has empowered and protected children and women in some of the world's most devastated warzones. What began in 2005 with a small, dedicated team from the United States and South Sudan, who shared a vision to help the most vulnerable children, has blossomed into a global network of hundreds of leaders across the US, Kenya, Sudan, and South Sudan.

This anniversary is more than a celebration — it is a testament to faith, resilience, and a deep commitment to those who are most at risk of exploitation in conflict zones. It is a tribute to our shared journey and to the many lives transformed through your unwavering support.

## From day one, our mission was clear — to prevent human trafficking before it begins. We set out with two key goals in mind:

- 1. To reach the children and women most vulnerable to trafficking and oppression, and
- 2. To invest in communities where others would not go due to remoteness, danger, and limited resources.

This vision led us to the war-torn regions of Sudan and South Sudan — countries ravaged by decades of violence and extreme poverty, where vulnerable people, especially children, are kidnapped as soldiers, sold into sex slavery, or trapped in forced labor.

In these countries, where infrastructure is minimal and poverty is widespread, LUV is not simply filling gaps — we are creating entirely new, sustainable structures to provide holistic care. **Our focus is on physical, spiritual, and emotional restoration for those most at risk.** 

As you can imagine, none of this would be possible without you — our compassionate partners whose generosity enables us to carry out this critical and life-giving work in some of the most difficult places on earth.

#### Over the next five years, we aim to:

- Finalize all baseline infrastructure needs: offer critical renovations to 18+ year-old buildings, expand infrastructure with more solar-powered pumping stations for clean water distribution, and construct new buildings that will improve services for children and staff in our programs.
- Achieve our economic development and food security goals through the expansion of our school farms.
- Increase the quality of care we offer through our trauma-informed protection, education, and discipleship programs, including launching new adult literacy groups and leadership development opportunities for students.
- Create a sustainable future through selling locally grown food and investing in more income generating programs for our local partners.

Together, we are building something far greater than any of us could have imagined — a lasting, God-sized mission that will continue to touch lives and create change for generations to come.
